What is a style guide?

- Style guides are formalized standards for writing documents
- Generally are set by specific fields, organization or publications
- Create consistency in adhering to writing and design rules
- Provide formatting styles for citation and bibliographies
- Receive periodic review to ensure they address contemporary trends

Types of style Manuals

AAA: Stands for **A**merican **A**nthropological **A**ssociation - Anthropology

- **APA**: Stands for **A**merican **P**sychological **A**ssociation - Business, Education, Psychology, and other Social Sciences
- **ASA**: Stand for **A**merican **S**ociological **A**ssociation - Sociology
- **Chicago** (Documentary-Note Style): Literature, History, and the Arts
- **Chicago** (Author-Date System): Physical, Natural, and Social Sciences
- **CSE**: Stands for **C**ouncil of **S**cience **E**ditors - Science
- **MLA**: Stands for **M**odern **L**anguage **A**ssociation - Literature, Arts and the Humanities
- **Turabian**: History

What style guide do I use?

- The students will be asked to use the particular style guide by their teachers.
- The publishers will give guidelines as which style guide is to be used
- Most of the time the determination of the style guide depends on the document as we have seen in the previous slide

- Style Manuals are your best resources
- They contain suggestions and rules for:
 - ✓ Manuscript structure and writing suggestions
 - ✓ Clear and concise writing
 - ✓ Reducing bias
 - ✓ Preventing plagiarism
 - ✓ Mechanics of writing
 - ✓ Punctuation, spelling, abbreviations, and numbers
 - ✓ Results
 - ✓ Table and data display rules
 - ✓ Citation guidelines
 - ✓ Reference rules

APA Style Guide

- This style's latest manual is the 6th edition of the publication Manual of the American Psychological Association
- Online resource : <https://apastyle.apa.org/>
- APA is generally used by the social and behavioral sciences.
- Created by the United States National Research Council
- In text citation (Author, Year, pp. ##-##)
- "References of all cited documents in alphabetical order at the end of the manuscript"

MLA Style guide : <https://style.mla.org/mla-format/>

- MLA style has two style manuals
 - MLA Style Manual and Guide to Scholarly Publishing (3rd edition – 2008)
 - MLA handbook for Writers of Research Papers (7th edition – 2009) \largely used for documentation in the humanities, specifically languages and literature, including English, Modern Languages and Comparative Literature
- Basic citation characteristics
- Minimized in-text citation (Author,#)
 - “Works cited” of all cited documents in alphabetical order at the end of manuscript
